



Mental Health Strategies for the Justice System

Background

- Fifty per cent of the community experience mental illness at some time in life—20 per cent in past year.
- Forty per cent of prison entrants report mental illness.
- Schizophrenia and depression are three to five times more common amongst prisoners.
- Justice, health and human services agencies assist and manage people with mental illness.
- Three mental health plans since 2009—none with a comprehensive framework to improve justice system pathways.



Audit objective and scope

Objective

To examine the effectiveness of planning and coordination for mental health across Victoria's criminal justice system.

Scope

- Each of the key phases of the criminal justice system:
 - Police interventions
 - Courts interventions
 - Custodial interventions
 - Community interventions
- Victoria Police.
- The Magistrates' Court—for which services are now provided by Court Services Victoria.
- Departments of Justice, Health, Human Services.



Conclusions

- Increasing interactions between people with mental illness and the justice system.
- Justice and health agencies have initiatives to address mental illness, but there are gaps.
- No overarching plan or leadership that focuses on improving outcomes for people with mental illness.
- Agencies are working together, but further collaboration would improve outcomes.
- Unclear responsibility for coordinating agencies, and a lack of accountability for success.




Key findings – police

- Police incidents tripled 2009–10 to 2013–14.

Key findings – police


- Victoria Police and the Department of Health (DH) developing strategic engagement.
- Attention to governance of local services coordination.



Key findings – courts

- Mental health courts and programs since 2002.
- Potential to reduce rates of imprisonment
- Client needs becoming more complex meaning fewer can be supported.

Key findings – courts


- No current plan guiding further development.
- Absence of strategic coordination.
- Opportunities to strengthen existing services.



Key findings – police custody and prison

- Mental health beds have not kept pace with demand.
- Waiting times for Thomas Embling have increased.

Key findings – police custody and prison

- No integrated plan for mental health.
- Department of Justice (DOJ) and DH are planning.
- Victoria Police not monitoring average time to transfer.



Key findings – community supervision and post-release

- More offenders with high mental health risk under supervision or released.

**Prisoners released with risk rating
for mental illness**

Risk rating	2009–10	2013–14	Increase (per cent)
P1 – Serious requires intensive and immediate care	46	67	46
P2 – Significant: requires treatment	127	119	-6
P3 – Stable: requires continuing treatment	933	1 300	39



Key findings – community supervision and post-release – *continued*

- Support in community can reduce re-offending.
- DOJ, DH and the Department of Human Services not effectively coordinating justice system planning.
